Kigali hosted the world at IAS2025 this August, and the contradictions could not have

been sharper.
On one hand, the retreat of **U.S. government funding cast a long shadow**, a reminder of

how fragile progress becomes when it is tethered to the whims of donors.

On the other, **African scientists**, **advocates**, **and communities refused to be eclipsed**,

asserting a future where HIV cure research, prevention, and health systems are led and owned here at home.

The conference made one thing undeniable: **global health is at a crossroads**. While right-

wing governments slash commitments and anti-gender movements redraw the terrain of rights, communities continue to organise, innovate, and resist.

The **HIV Cure Consortium's** work in Zambia, the courageous testimonies of people living

with HIV, and the insistence of African organisations on African solutions all stood as defiance in the face of abandonment.

But our struggle does not exist in isolation.

From the deliberate destruction of Gaza's health system to the erasure of queer lives

across our continent, to the creeping normalisation of authoritarian politics worldwide, we are reminded that health justice is inseparable from broader struggles for dignity, safety, and

a time".


